It is our role to give our young people the knowledge to adapt to these new opportunities and the transferable skills of strong decision making, leadership, team work and communication which all employers look for. On Tuesday 11th March, Year 8 attended a Science, Technology, Engineer and Maths (STEM) roadshow organised by BAE Systems, the Royal Air Force and the Royal Navy. The focus of the roadshow was Artificial Intelligence (AI).

The presenters showed the students how easy it was to generate a pop song on a subject of their choice - one student chose "Burgers". The lyrics to the song were generated in a matter of moments and within minutes an actual track had been voted as the audience's favourite and by the end of the roadshow a red-headed woman, in a green leather jacket, standing in a cave (again, the student's choice) was singing the track on a video.

Students learnt about how to spot deep fakes on the internet and were able to get one of the presenter's AI-generated avatars to say anything. It looked just like a video of the presenter. Students were told how easy it is for the photos we post online to be used to generate AI avatars. *(Article continues on the next page.)* 





The highlight of the show was Lexi, the AI dog. Students watched Lexi navigate through a maze of students using her sensors and her AI capabilities. She also waved goodbye at the end of the show and did some tricks through voice commands, much like you would give to your own dog. At the end of the show, she was packed up into her box and instead of being walked at night, she was going to be plugged in and recharged.

#### ENGLISH LITERATURE LECTURER INSPIRES SIXTH FORMERS



This week, Sixth Form English Literature students enjoyed a virtual event with Iceland based lecturer, Dr Beth Cortese.

Dr. Beth Cortese is a Lecturer in Restoration and Eighteenthcentury English Literature at the University of Iceland where she teaches and researches British Literature from the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. She also teaches literary theory and creative writing at the university.

She spoke to students about her time studying English Literature and Creative Writing for her BA and English Literature for her MA at Lancaster University, U.K. and completing her PhD in English Literature at Lancaster University in 2018 on the topic of 'Women's Wit Onstage'

Beth gave students a first hand insight into careers based around English Literature and students shared how inspired they felt after the talk ended. One student said, "I now have so many ideas!" Thank you to Beth for helping to inspire our students.

### GIANFRANCO CONTI - MFL CONFERENCE



On Wednesday, we were delighted to welcome internationally renowned language acquisition and metacognition expert Gianfranco Conti as he lead a CPD workshop for staff from Futures Education Institute partner schools.

Gianfranco Conti Phd (Applied Linguistics, MA (TEFL), MA (English Lit), PGCE (Modern Languages and PE) is an international keynote speaker, professional development provider, writer, blogger and co-author of best-selling books 'The language teacher toolkit', 'Breaking the sound barrier: teaching learners how to listen' and 'Memory: what every language teacher should know'. A language teacher for around 30 years, Gianfranco is also the founder of the language learning website www.language -gym.

It was a honour to host such a prestigious conference and to be able to support our own MFL department in accessing this incredible opportunity. Feedback from the session was extremely complimentary, as staff shared how much they benefitted from Gianfranco Conti's expertise.





#### A Level Drama Examination



Year 13 were examined in their final pieces this week by an external examiner, opening the doors to 'Friends and Family' on Monday evening for a dress and technical rehearsal and culminating in two great performances on Tuesday. A scene from the Crucible was performed using the multi-media and props- focused influence of the theatre practitioner Katie Mitchell, alongside Stanislavski's naturalism to form the text base piece and the original devised performance was a re-telling of Shakespeare's classic, 'A Winter's Tale', in the style of the comedic, fast paced, non- naturalistic Splendid Theatre Company. A student and staff audience supported the performers and the performances were assisted by Owen, our Year 12 Theatre Technician. 'All their hard work and commitment really paid off', said Mrs Cook, Head of Drama, "both pieces held challenge and complexity



in their own way giving the audience a dichotomy of emotion, style and characterisation. They delivered with panache and confidence and I'm so proud of all their hard work and commitment."





Staff reviews came flooding in and Mr Wood, Deputy Head, really captured the atmosphere of both pieces when he said :

"Well done to all. Two fantastically juxtaposing pieces. The Crucible was dramatically moving, with an intensity to the performances that made the emotions feel real. As an audience member there were moments that made me feel uncomfortable, a testament to the collective chemistry and individual brilliance of all three performers. The energy of the second performance was particularly impressive. There were lots of causes to laugh, all underpinned by the disturbing reality of the perpetual power of the patriarchy. The fluency of performance made a black comedy of the harrowing reality of a trial in the court of public opinion. A particular highlight for me (aside from the moustaches...) was the twisting of the technical team in the background - the fact that they were unnoticeable (the highest accolade for any technical team) means that they performed a thoroughly professional job." Well done Year 13 !
