




Launching our Year 10 'Golden Retriever' Program

This week, we launched 'Golden Retrievers', our new Year 10 high profile, low stakes quizzing which will run across three assessment windows in the academic year. These quizzes focus on over learning and retrieving essential AO1 content from each GCSE or vocational course content. Departments have analysed the specification for their course and constructed a series of 40 questions relevant to where students are at in their Year 10 learning journey and designed them to help identify any gaps in student knowledge. As a school we will analyse trends in response and class teachers will address individual and group misconceptions to make sure no learner is left behind and all students have a launch pad for future progress.

On average 33% of all KS4 papers are centred on AO1 knowledge such as values, dates, true or false responses, multiple choice questions or single word responses naming key features. Our 'Golden Retriever' program is designed to make AO1 content even more explicit and enable our students to have multiple opportunities to practice retrieving this knowledge from their long-term memory and make AO2 application of this knowledge even more accessible.

CELEBRATING CREATIVITY AND SHARING INSPIRING OPPORTUNITIES

TONAL DRAWING AND BIRO DRAWING

In the first few weeks of their Fine Art rotation, Year 7 students started to improve their technical drawing skills by utilising techniques such as grids, guidelines, basic shapes and measurements. It has been fantastic to see the level of progress that each student has made individually based on their starting point. Students in the class have been supportive of each other, showing great levels of self-discipline and engagement (PRIDE) when providing constructive feedback to their peers. More recently they have focussed on how tone and mark making can be applied to represent the 3D form and texture of the subject. They have considered how to capture the density of the fur and feathers as well as how contouring can be used to further enhance form and shape. I'm sure you'll agree, the quality of some of the outcomes are phenomenal.... And as a result they are being given the challenge to produce a biro and ink and stick drawing of a highland cow in upcoming lessons. Keep up the great work Year 7!

ETCHING PRINTING

After beginning to explore quality of line drawing techniques, Miss Webster's Year 10 Art, Craft and Design class have applied their knowledge and understanding to dry point etching. After initially selecting and controlling the application of line and

mark-making techniques to represent the tone and texture of their chosen subjects, they will now continue to question whether or not the can capture mood, atmosphere and emotion through the printing process. This will see them printing onto alternative surfaces, modifying the application of the ink and/ or working back into their prints to fuse together a combination of styles relevant to their theme. We look forward to seeing the end results. This could be a portrait or full figure dependent upon your levels of confidence Top Tips: Work from a photograph Use the proportions of the human figure to construct your figure Use the proportions of the face to add the facial features (you must include; eyes, nose, mouth and eye brows) 'Twist' the rules of proportion to exaggerate and emphasise certain distinctive features Think about the facial expressions to show emotion Select colour palettes appropriately to show and emphasise emotion Think about using body language to show emotion and/ or link to an action/ activity taking place Use props and other items and objects to communicate information about hobbies/ interests/ likes/ dislikes Include a background to help aid the telling of the 'story' and information about the character
